Mayor Pro Tem Nick Long – Thank you, Mayor. In Library news, explore the excitement of watersports on Saturday, July 16 from 1 to 2 p.m. Captain Dave will introduce the exhilarating sports of kitesurfing and foilboarding. Find out more about it on the library's website. This program is for all ages. On Wednesday, July 20, learn about how the surrounding bodies of water impact our weather. This program is presented by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and will be held at the Civic Center from 2 to 3 p.m. for Kindergarten to 5th grade children and their families. Teens, come be a part of our Teen Late Night: Mario Kart Marathon on Friday, July 22 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. The race is a head-to-head and see who comes out the victor. This program is for teens ages 12 to 18. That's all I have, Mayor.

Hank Dugie – Very quickly, thank you to staff for fantastic festivities on the 3rd and the 4th. Always one of the best programs the city puts on. Thank you for a job well done again. That's it, thank you.

Larry Millican – Thank you, Mayor. I'd like to start off tonight thanking everybody for coming out or tuning into Channel 16 or live streaming or however you're viewing the meeting tonight. The first announcement I want to talk about is from H-GAC. They're going to be having a meeting of the Clear Creek Watershed Partnership, this Friday on the 15th, from 1:30 to 3:30 at the Pearland Public Library. You can attend it virtually, and you can get the website from H-GAC or I think that I gave that to Ms. Osborne, that she is going to post it on public media, too. This is a study for Clear Creek and the water quality issues for Clear Creek. It includes the entire watershed and this is going to be the second or third meeting that they've had on that. Then, I also wanted to talk about that I had Diana send to all of the Council and again I had Ms. Osborne send that on the public media, too, H-GAC is conducting a transportation vision survey. This is all electronic, it will take you about five minutes, but you'll have the ability to give your comments and rate what you'd like to see on the transportation side of our region and what's most important to you as far whether or not your commuting is important, or whatever facet of transportation whether it be transit or activities. There's a multiple-choice questionnaire and it will take you about five minutes and I'd like to have everybody in League City participate. I think the more that we have participate the better outcome it's going to have for our citizens in the future of transportation in our region.

Also, I'd like to make sure that everybody's aware of the method of distribution. We talked about it I think at the last meeting. It has been signed off on by HUD and the GLO. Those dollars are working their way down, but we've got public meetings that have to take place. One of them is going to take place later this week, on Thursday from 5:30 to 7:30, it's a virtual meeting. That's going to be a question and answer, and anybody can come in and discuss their concerns with the panel that's going to be presenting. This is a federal project, this discussion will be recorded and acted upon, and when I say that, just remember, important to all the people in League City is that the conditions and requirements for the low-to-moderate income at 51 percent is going to pretty much put us in a bind as far as using those funds. If you have a concern about the distribution of those dollars or the use of those dollars, then I would suggest that you speak up and be heard. There's also going to be an in-person meeting, virtual, but that meeting is going to be nothing more than a presentation meeting and it's going to be held on the following week on the 21st.
