#### 2. <u>RECEIVE AND DISCUSSS CLEAR CREEK INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT'S</u> 2016 DEMOGRAPHIC REPORT AND PLANS TO MANAGE FUTURE GROWTH

Dr. Greg Smith, Superintendent with Clear Creek Independent School District (CCISD) introduced Bob Templeton with Templeton Demographics, who gave a brief presentation on the 2016 Demographic Update for the Houston area. In Summary, year-over-year job growth has slowed in the Houston MSA due to losses in the oil and information sectors. Oil prices have started to rebound in late 2016, and are currently over \$50 a barrel. Clear Creek ISD had the most annual closings since 2008. Mar Bella and Hidden Lakes are the most active developments in the district, accounting for 35% of district new home closings in 2016. Clear Creek ISD may reach 42,500 students by 2017. With a five-year enrollment growth of 2,108 the fall 2021 enrollment could see 44,004. For a ten-year enrollment growth of 3,893 the fall 2026 enrollment could see 45,789.

Dr. Greg Smith gave an overview of proposed construction, renovation and improvements for the campuses located in League City which includes Hall Elementary (Elementary #27), Creekside Intermediate School, League City Elementary School, Clear Path Alternative School, Ross Elementary School, Walter Hall Elementary, Clear Creek High School, Clear Creek Intermediate School, League City Intermediate School and Main Transportation Center. Major Projects totaled \$166,193,357 and Priority 1 Projects totaled \$49,537,375 for an overall total for League City Projects at \$215,730,357.
