Summer 2018 Citizen Survey – Question #12: What long-term goals (5+years) should Council and City staff be focused on? 56% (35% Traffic, roads and mobility), 11% Flooding and drainage, 10% Infrastructure/Planned growth.

FY2019 Adopted Budget

Needs - \$230 million

Drainage \$120 million

General Obligation Bonds:

Needs with large economic size and long economic life Issuance of Debt Voted by the taxpayers Property tax based Competitive Interest – full faith and credit, plus votes

Financial Impact:

The financial impact can be determined once we have a general idea of the amount needed in GO debt per year

The debt service payment will be calculated with the amount of debt retired each year figures in, the option of property tax increase, and with additional sales tax revenue Intent will be to limit impact on the property tax rate
