I'm truly a blessed man to live in a community where so many people care about one another and to have so many people praying for me with the tumor operation. I really felt like I could feel the energy while I was laying in the bed after the surgery was over and it was kind of a transcendent feeling. I want to thank everyone for all the get-well cards and all their thoughts and prayers. I want to thank the Mayor and my fellow Council Members for all their well-wishes. I'd also like to thank John and his team, especially Andy, who was constantly checking in with my wife and then me. I'd like to thank Nghiem and his team, they stopped by with a get well card and some cake balls. They were awesome, by the way. I'd be remiss if I didn't thank Mike Kramm, as well as the Communications staff and Ryan, just constantly checking in and I really appreciate it. Last, but not least, my beautiful wife Heather. There really aren't words for me to describe how awesome she was through all this. She's the most amazing person I know and was just amazing taking care of me. I love you, sweets.

Finally, at the Library - On Wednesday, September 11, we welcome Children's performer Julian Franklin as he presents his program Sport of Champions. This program will feature puppets and cover math concepts, ways to exercise the brain and how to exercise our bodies, as well. The fun takes place in 2 sessions: one at 10:15 a.m. and one at 11:00 a.m.; both in the Library Theater. Also, on Wednesday, September 11, teens between the ages of 12 to 18 years will take part in Manga Mania and learn the art of manga drawing. Nick Long – Thanks everybody for being here. Tomorrow's September 11, just take a minute to reflect on it. It's been almost 20 years since that occurred but there are still a lot of people it affects every day, the veterans serving overseas as an indirect result of that day, and people who lost family members and friends in those attacks.

Andy Mann had no comments.

Hank Dugie – Thank everyone for being here. Dave spoke a little bit about the flood mitigation process that we've been going through the last few years and we're getting closer so keep the faith and keep pushing, keep us accountable so that we can get to the end of the road and create some long-lasting substantial change. I do have some good news. There is a ballot initiative for November 5, I think it's Proposition 8, for flood infrastructure fund. I'm still finding out information about the particulars, but I would encourage each of you and the City to look more into what that's all about because when we get to the end of the line and we have this list of projects, we're going to have to have a funding source. The money that's coming from HUD is one source but if there's another source coming from the State by all means we know it's going to be costly to create real change, so let's look into that and as we get more information let's make sure citizens are aware of that ballot issue in November. Todd, it's good to have you back.

Larry Millican had no comments.

Mayor Hallisey – I want to talk about, just for a second, Chief Warren, Tommy Cones, and our League City Volunteer Fire Department, who organized a Memorial Stair Climb. It was out at the Fire Drill Field last Saturday. There were five or six different fire departments that were represented there and they climbed those stairs 348 times to acknowledge those people who ran into harm's way, and one of the speakers out there made an interesting comment that caught my attention. He said you know, firemen, policemen, when the rest of us are running away from tough times, they're the people that are running in to save us. It was appropriate that it was Saturday, it's more appropriate that we talk about that a little bit tonight because tomorrow is 9/11, the worst attack ever on American soil. There were an awful lot of people killed, I can't even imagine, as I said out there the other day, almost every one of us remember exactly where we were when somebody called and said turn on the TV, the first Trade Center's been hit. And it came on and a few minutes later, or an hour later, time kind of got lost that day, the second Trade Center got hit. And there were people bailing off the top of roofs just to get away. I can't even imagine what the panic was for people that were going through that. The bottom line of that story is, or the moral of that story is freedom isn't free, it costs and it has cost through our history with the blood of our brothers who stood so that we have the freedoms we live with every single day, and that we take for granted. So, when you get up tomorrow morning and you turn on your TV and have your cup of coffee, think about just saying a short prayer for those that were lost during the 9/11 and think about those firemen and

policemen, not only up there, but here at home who give there life for us and if you see one around town tomorrow, one of our policemen or firemen, thank them for their service because they do a great job for us. I'm really proud of those young women from the Legion, I was taken back this morning when that phone call came in reminding me of what it was like during Hurricane Harvey. I spent every day down at that distribution center and I spent every day going out trying to help somebody that was hurting somewhere and there were so many wonderful people across this country that phoned us and said, I'm in Mustang, Oklahoma, I've got two tractor trailers full of supplies, I'm coming down to help you because I used to go to Clear Creek High School, and we just were going, wow! And people from Florida, Atlanta, California, Wyoming, all of them loading up tractor trailers to get supplies down to us. I bet half of them didn't even know where League City, Texas was and wherever I go now, I ask people if they know where we are. It's amazing how many people do. But our hearts were full by the people who gave to us, and what these young people reminded me of this morning was once again, life's not free, freedom isn't free, and every chance we get to help somebody, it makes us better people and I hope that all of you here tonight and all of you at home will dig down in your pantry and get supplies and drop them off at the American Legion so they can get them to the people in the Bahamas. Somebody said to me during the day, well that's not part of America. Well, you know our heart ought to be big enough in America, catastrophes are catastrophes and we need to be helpful in every way we can, and it takes children sometimes to remind us that we need to get off our duff and do something for other people. So, God bless them, God bless you, and God bless those people in the Bahamas and up and down eastern seaboard who really took it on the chin from a very catastrophic storm. So, please, dig in your pantries, help out, take your stuff down to the Legion and they'll get it over to Florida and over to the Bahamas. Everywhere I go, I get asked this question, so I'm going to answer it once and for all. For those of you that remember Gilley's, it is not coming to League City. The honkytonk is not coming. We are being talked to by Gilley Interests for a family restaurant and boutique hotel. It is being built on private property, somebody bought that property and they are going to re-sell it just like they did the Holiday Inn on 96 and the freeway. This is not a City-sponsored deal. They have asked for nothing. There seem to be a lot of rumors flying around town how we're digging down into our reserves to pay for these things. Not true. We still would like to get a convention center across the street, that is still on our radar. I'm not sure we're going to be able to do it the way we had originally intended. But for every person in this town that doesn't want to pay another penny in property taxes, and I hear that all the time, how do you expect the City to grow like League City. Sales taxes are generated by people buying services and goods and it is not a tax on your property. It's a bold move, the Governor limited us to 2.5% growth on property taxes every year. Whether we like it or not, it is the law. And we have 48% of our land area yet to be developed in this town. The Grand Parkway is going to bring a bunch of new, hopefully, businesses along it. It's already being filled up with residential. Residences by themselves don't make it a better life around here, but the average house cost in this city today is \$350,000. They are certainly paying their way at that rate. The

property down along Clear Creek and Wesley is developing as well. Scott Livingston, our Economic Development Director, and David Hoover, our Planning Director, have been masterful in getting these people to come and build businesses here. Businesses are like a profit to the City. We don't have to provide the same level of service. We put that money back into needs of this community. And hopefully, if we can pull this off on the sales tax, we can start to see a leveling off or a reduction of our property tax values in this town. It's a bold move, this Council has been ingenious. We thought we had a good deal with the original developers, but they're like everybody else that's out building, having a difficult time accessing capital. And anybody that wants to come up with a half a billion dollars to help us do this, I'm for it. Anyway, we are not getting a Gilley's, and I get more phone calls about, we can't have another honkytonk in town. Yes, ma'am, I agree with you. There's not going be a honkytonk, what honkytonk? Well, Gilley's. No, that's not going to be a honkytonk. It may have a small music venue in there, but it is not a honkytonk, and it will be a tax-paying business in the City of League City.
